

We are entirely separate from the University and we operate nine unique student-focused businesses in the Student Union Building (SUB). We work on a broad array of issues that affect students and we work hard to ensure that their voices are heard by the University administration and all levels of government.

SOCIAL JUSTICE



GOVERNANCE

A democratically elected student Board of Directors oversees the UVSS. The Board meets twice a month in order to effectively govern the Society. Students are invited to actively participate on the Board's various committees.

The Board consists of the following directors:

Elections for these positions take place in March, with the exception of: the representatives for the Third Space Women's Centre, UVic Pride, the Native Students Union (NSU), the Students of Colour Collective (SOCC) and the Society for Students with a Disability (SSD); these groups elect their representatives to the Board of Directors at their general meetings.

THE STUDENT UNION BUILDING (SUB)

The UVSS operates nine businesses located in the Student Union Building. These businesses are social enterprises (businesses run for a social good) and their profits go back to students in the form of advocacy, events, and services. Many of the UVSS businesses have been recently renovated so that they are better able to serve students. The following are the nine UVSS businesses:

Health Food Bar (HFB)

Wraps, sandwiches, fresh juice, and smoothies. Vegan and gluten free options.

The Grill

Dahls, curries, burgers, and more. Vegan and aluten free options.

Bean There Cafe

Pizza, sushi, bagels, muffins, breakfast sandwiches, and coffee.

Munchie Bar

Best coffee, espresso, and americano on campus.

Felicita's Campus Pub

Beer, wine, liquor, food, live music, karaoke, and other great events.

Cinecenta Movie Theatre

Indie, foreign, and Hollywood films, and damn fine popcorn.

Zap Copy – Digital Print Centre

7 cent copies, wide format printing, binding, and old exams.

SUBText – Books & Things

Used textbooks, magazines, cards, gifts, snacks, and drinks.

Catering & Conference Services

Meeting room bookings and catering.

- · Created a document that explains how to read the budget
- · Trained 3 new campuses in BC to offer the *Let's Get Consensual* campaign and host their own consent workshops

Grants Now

This year we launched our *Grants Now* campaign in partnership with the Simon Fraser Student Society (SFSS), the UBC Alma Mater Society (UBC AMS), and the Alliance of BC Students (ABCS). Students in post-secondary are paying outrageous amounts in tuition-fees, textbook costs and living expenses. Needs-based grants for students from lowerincome families would open up opportunities for tons of students. This is why we are collecting signatures on a petition asking the BC government to create a grants program. Right now, BC is the only province without a comprehensive needs-based grants program. Through coordinated lobbying with the UBC AMS and the SFSS, we presented our recommendation to various cabinet ministers and MLA's. Similarly, we coordinated presentations to the Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services. In order to ensure that people from all walks of life are able to pursue an education, we will continue to lobby and push for needs-based grants.



ReThink Mental Health is a campaign focused on bringing awareness to mental health on campus. Students are at a time in their lives where they are often transitioning into having more responsibilities, learning about themselves and dealing with difficult situations. For this reason, it is extremely important to work self-care and supporting each other into our everyday lives.

This year, we have coordinated with UBC AMS and SFSS to lobby the BC government for more mental health resources at post-secondary institutions including an overarching provincial post-secondary mental health strategy. Since then, we met with the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions to give our input on needed initiatives. Alongside encouraging the BC government to prioritize this issue, the UVSS has taken initiative at our own campus. We held the 4th Annual Mental Health Showcase event where we brought student talent in from across campus to share their experiences with mental health through some form of art. Rae Spoon headlined this event and it was a success. We worked with the University to bring the Friendship Bench to our campus. The



Friendship Bench is a bright yellow, physical reminder for students to take a minute to breathe and take care of themselves that also links students to mental health resources. We held both the Mental Health Showcase and the Friendship Bench unveiling during Mental Health Awareness Week.

Rent with Rights

Rent with Rights is a housing campaign for affordable and accessible student housing. This campaign was launched in 2016 as a collaboration between the UVSS, SFSS, and the UBC AMS. With vacancy rates as low as 0.2%, students and lower-income people are struggling to find safe, accessible and affordable places to live. It is evident that student housing presents a viable solution to this issue as taking students out of the off-campus market, opens space for community members and drives down prices. However, universities are currently restricted from financing student housing through debt.

This year, we continued to lobby all levels of government, including the Ministry of Housing and Social Development about the need for more oncampus housing. We presented our recommendation of needed change in debt restrictions to the BC Standina Committee on Finance and Government Services. We have taken different routes to spread the importance of this issue to the broader community. Not only have we lobbied at municipal levels, we have also gone into specific Greater Victoria neighbourhoods and spoken to community

members about the struggles students are facing. We also used social media to share horror stories that UVic students' submitted about their housing situations to further push the importance of much needed on-campus housing.

Through our dedicated and coordinated efforts, there is a real potential for a solution and not just for students, but for the many low-income families who have to live every day with the reality of rising rents.

Safer Use

The Safer Use campaign was developed and launched as a method of combating the current opioid crisis in BC. Recognizing that the fentanyl crisis partially exists due to the stigmatization of substance use and the lack of resources for those that use was an important part of building the philosophy that guides this campaign. Students on campuses have been engaging in substance use, whether it is alcohol or drugs, for a very long time. Instead of turning a blind eye or encouraging abstinence, we decided to share information on how to be safer when using substances as well as how to respond to an overdose. Not only did we receive a great response from students, but this campaign also received lots of media coverage.

We partnered with UVic Health Services to become one of the first campuses in BC to offer naloxone training. Since September 2017, we have been offering two sessions of naloxone training each month and had very high attendance each time. We also coordinated with the SFSS and the UBC AMS to lobby the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions for greater support for harm reduction at post-secondary institutions.

Make Transit Work

In 2015, the Camosun College Student Society (CCSS) and the University of Victoria Student Society

successfully lobbied for a rotating seat on the Greater Victoria Transit Commission. This year it was the UVSS' turn to sit at the table with the other members of the Commission. This meant meeting regularly with our fellow members of the Greater Victoria Transit Alliance (Unifor 333, CCSS and the UVic Graduate Students' Society) and taking our ideas for more efficient service back to the Commission. Through meeting and building relationships with local mayors, we were able to encourage the Commission to successfully pass two motions. The first was to write a letter to the Ministry of Transportation asking for a change in legislation that would make the student seat on the Commission a voting seat and the second was to instruct BC Transit to work with the Student Societies to create a reduced student summer pass.

Let's Get Consensual

As a part of our ongoing and successful Let's Get Consensual campaign, we have continued to conduct outreach and support the Anti-Violence project and UVic CARE leaders in promoting healthy relationships and consent. This year we incorporated the message "We Believe Survivors" to add a support component to a strong consent campaign.

Our 3rd Annual Sexualized Violence Awareness Week was a great success. We kicked off with keynote speaker Farrah Khan at the event "We Begin by Listening" which drew over 300 students, staff, and community members for an excellent discussion of the importance of consent. And we hosted a survivorthemed craft fair in the quad featuring slam poets.

FINANCE & OPERATIONS

Strategic Planning

This year the UVSS extended and built upon the two-year strategic plan initiated by the 2016-2017 Board of Directors. The new three-year strategic plan identifies increasing financial strain and negative public image as the major strategic priorities confronting the UVSS. These are both long-term issues that will continue to affect future boards.

Organizational Improvements

After two years of hard work, on December 11th the Board of Directors adopted a comprehensive Human Resources policy. During the summer, a consultation committee was struck where directors, staff, and representatives from the advocacy groups collaborated to complete this project. An employee handbook is included to help our staff navigate their employment with the UVSS. This policy will contribute to the UVSS being a positive working environment with an established learning culture for all members of our team.

Financial Position

The UVSS started the year with over \$150,000 in accumulated deficit. The previous board began the process of paying down the accumulated debt and this year we projected a surplus of over \$10,000 to continue this process. Currently, the board is approximately \$26,000 ahead of budget for this year.

Health and Dental Plan

Last year, the Health and Dental Plan was short the necessary funds to cover the claims submitted by our members. This brought to light major structural challenges faced by the plan that need to be altered. The structure of the plan has not been modernized since its adoption in 2003 and as such does not meet the needs of our current members. As a result of all of these challenges, last year's board had to make drastic changes to



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the plan in order to offer a plan to members at all.

In the spring, members will be asked through referendum to approve a massive overhaul to the Health and Dental plan. The UVSS has consulted with stakeholders in order to create a plan with a new fee structure and more choice for students in their coverage. It is time that the plan is updated to meet the needs of students today.



FINANCE & OPERATIONS

Making Finance Fun and Accessible

This year we continued to improve the way that our financial information is presented to our members. We maintained the practice of using a clear and accessible visual presentation to show students the way that their student fees are spent at the Annual General Meeting. In addition, we have created a document on how to read the student society budget, which is included in the finance section of the UVSS website.



SUB Renovations

The major renovations that the UVSS undertook in 2012 are reaching completion this year. The Michele Pujol Room was spruced up making the space cleaner and brighter with ezoboards installed to help control for noise. Also, the UVSS will be updating the technology at Zap! Copy to increase the ease of use for students fulfilling their printing needs.

New SUB Branding

Based on the results of previous market analyses, this year we launched new SUB branding complete with a logo and a robot mascot to create a clear brand identity that is differentiated from the



UVSS. The new and fun branding matches the anti-institutional and youthful personality of the various businesses inside the SUB.

CLUBS & COURSE UNIONS


Clubs

The UVSS has over 175 active clubs that cover a wide range of interests. Whether you are interested in anime or water skiing, there is a club for you. If you still can't find a group that strikes your fancy, you can always start your own. There were over 20 new clubs started this year alone, including the Live Music Club, Primate Project, and UVic Concrete Toboggan. Clubs have the chance to apply for Special Project Funding in addition to base funding. Some of the projects clubs have completed with this funding include: hosting a Taiwanese Film Festival, an Islam awareness week, putting on a Model UN conference, and attending a formula hybrid racing competition. Clubs also saw the rollout of an updated Clubs Handbook in the Fall term.

Course Unions

The UVSS has over 40 faculties represented by course unions and professional development unions (PDUs). Course unions and PDUs have access to academic and publication grants. Some course unions used their academic funding to put on conferences, such as the Western Canadian Undergraduate Philosophy Conference, or to host events, such as Meet the Prof Nights. Several course unions also produced publications that feature student work, such as The Albatross and Essence. All undergraduate students have access to Travel Pool funding, which the Course Union Council administers. This year travel pool sent students far and wide; there were grants to send students to San Diego for a RoboSub competition, Nova Scotia to present their research at the Canadian Economics Association Annual conference, and





over 40 students went to Vancouver for the BC Music Educators Association Conference. Course Unions also saw some updates to their handbook this year.

Clubs and Course Union Days

On September 13 & 14 and January 10 & 11, we had one of the largest Clubs and Course Union Days ever that featured over 140 UVSS clubs and course unions as well as numerous other Vikes clubs and on-campus student groups. The hallways were flooded as thousands of students came to sign up to join new clubs. Strolling down the rows of booths you could sample the various treats provided by clubs as incentives to sign up. Along the way could also encounter everything from rockets to the Swing Dancing Club ready to teach you how to Lindy hop.

Member Outreach

It's been an awesome year for outreach and we had amazing volunteers to help us out. We had volunteers show up super early for Pancake Breakfast and super late for movie night in the Quad. They stood out in the cold to help us table for campaigns such as Grants Now and Textbook Broke, as well as volunteered on committees to help with things like the health plan and town halls.

We ordered a ton of awesome swag items to hand out at Campus Kick-Off and other outreach events. Swag has been flying off the shelves since September, with our sticky notebooks, water bottles, tote bags, and pens all being close to gone as so many students have dropped by to pick them up. Our handbook has been especially successful - all 8000 were gone before December which is far ahead of our goal of 7500 by January.



This year we've made some great policy updates. The policy committee has gone through section by section and reworded and ameliorated policy from end to end. Some highlights include;

- · A clarification on the relationship between UVSS Clubs and Course Unions and UVSS events.
- Dissolved the Risk Management Advisory Committee and shared its responsibility between other committees in order to empower committees to directly work on Risk Management.
- · We've passed a new and comprehensive HR policy after months of collaboration and consultation with various stakeholders.





We hope that the streamlining of current policy will make it easier for future boards to keep track of and correctly implement our societies' policy. The creation of a



comprehensive HR policy that reflects years of practice as well as industry best practices is aimed at creating a better, safer, and more consistent work environment for all of our 200+ student, permanent, and excluded employees.

We've also been working on larger policy initiatives which could have long standing effects on future boards and how they function. The large-scale policy rework has been to overhaul the by-elections process. At the SAGM, student will be able to vote on whether or not they want to be able to elect interim Directors-at-Large at General Meetings much in the same way as other non-profit societies. This will not only allow the board to have a steady pool of Directorsat-Large, but it will also give power back to the people by making General Meetings more important and more relevant to the day-to-day operations of the Board.

FOOD BANK & FREE STORE

2017 was an eventful vear for the UVSS Food Bank and Free Store (FBFS), with a particularly dramatic rise in student demand for the services provided by the Food Bank. Throughout 2017, the Food Bank saw approximately 13,000 visits, an increase of nearly 20% compared to the number of visits logged in 2016. Notably, the months of October and December 2017 saw an exceptionally sudden rise in demand. with usage rates up 65% and 52%, respectively. This year also saw a change in the leadership of the FBFS. with longtime coordinators Jasmine Robertson and Courtney Striker moving on and being replaced by Alexandra Ages and Josephine Simpson. despite However. the change in personnel, the overall focus on food literacy and accessibility remained a core focus of the Food Bank team.

As the cost of tuition and housing continues to rise, it seems highly likely that the trend of increased food bank usaae will continue. In order to meet this demand. the Food Bank relies laraely on an exceptional volunteer base, currently composed of almost thirty dedicated food activists. as numerous well community connections. particularly the UVic Food Hub and the Victoria Food

Share Network. Alongside donations of time, the consistent support local businesses and other organizations in the form of physical donations has also allowed us to continue supporting our growing user base. In particular, we are exceptionally grateful for the continued support from Hoyne Brewing, Cobs Bread, Mustard Seed, Sea Cider Brewing, Stock-Tober and the support from UVic staff. Whole Foods, and the many individuals who have stepped forward to support us.

Going into 2018, the Food Bank and Free Store hopes to promote student support for our referendum, in which we will be asking the UVic Community to VOTE YES for the Food Bank to receive a fundina increase of \$0.75 for fulltime students and \$0.37 for part-time students. Though the 2017 referendum failed to meet quorum, we have high hopes that 2018 will be our year, and that with this much-needed increase in funding we will be able to both keep up with the growing student demand as well as continue to offer support for food literacy programs.




2017 Food Bank Usage

UVSS Food Bank and Free Store




December Usage ...




We saw a total of 728 visits last month, up 52% from last year.
